#### **Rex Amps and Guitars**

Rex amps and guitars were made in Melbourne from the late 1950s to mid 1960s by the Lamberti Brothers. The brand didn't achieve the same recognition as other brands such as Moody, Golden, and Vadis were well made and of quality construction.

### **Jason Amplifiers**

Jason amps were a house brand of J. Stanley Johnson, a music shop in Sydney. Parts were sourced from early Japanese and Australian manufacturers. It is unknown if the amps were assembled in Japan or Australia.

#### **Pacific Guitars**

Pacific guitars were made in Melbourne from the late 1920s by Hector McLennon and branded with his name. By the mid 1940s he made a variety of guitars and ukeleles including flat top, cowboy, and Hawaiian style.

## **Wayne Guitars**

Wayne guitars were made in Melbourne by Harry, Sid, and John West from the early 1950s to late 1960s. They produced a variety of styles including resonator, dobro, flat top, and cheap acoustics

#### J.M.G Instruments

J.M.G emerged in Perth after WWII and their instruments were made by returned servicemen and POW's as therapy and employment.

#### **Maxim Instruments & Amplifiers**

Maxim were one of Australia's first electric guitar makers, made by Peter McCarthy in the mid 1930s in Melbourne. Peter's son Brian also made lap steel Hawaiian style guitars and amplifiers.

#### **Maton Guitars & Amplifiers**

Bill May opened his Maton factory in Melbourne in the early 1940s, and the family owned brand continues to produce quality instruments to this day.

## **Overeem Amplifiers**

Overeem amps were built in Darra, in Brisbane, by Hans Overeem in 1969. He was an early manufacturer over solid state amplifiers as opposed to the more common vale amplifiers being used at the time. This resulted in a much lighter amplifier, preferred by musicians who had to carry them around.

#### Wasp

Wasp amps were originally built by Ron Holden in Christchurch, New Zealand in 1967. Originally called Holden amps, the business was sold to Ian Johnstone and Doug Henderson in Sydney and became known as Holden / Wasp. They were huge valve amplifiers, that while very heavy were of quality constructions. They were popular with Sydney based musicians from the early 1970s onwards.

## **Goldentone Amplifiers**

Goldentone were one of the largest amplifier manufacturers in Australia in the 1960s. They produced a wide variety of models, mostly valve amps in the 1960s then moved to solid state construction.

#### Moody

Moody guitars amps, pickups, lap steels were made by Rob Moody in the early 1960s in Sydney. It was a time when amp and guitar makers around the world had to compete with the British and American manufacturers. Moody became very popular.

#### **Vadis**


Vadis amps were made by Soundcraft Pty Ltd during the 1960s and early 70s in Sydney. They had a great sound and are still being used by some musicians today.

#### Vase

Built in North Brisbane in the mid 1960s by Tony Troughton.

#### **Trent**

Trent amps were built in Brisbane by Murrie Walton from the mid 1960s to early 70s. They were uniquely red as opposed to the common black colourings.
